National Council for Special Education Child Safeguarding Statement June 2020

Who we are

The National Council for Special Education (NCSE) is an independent statutory body set up to improve the delivery of education services to persons with special educational needs with particular emphasis on children. The NCSE supports an inclusive education system that enables students and adults with special educational needs to achieve their potential.

Nature of our services

We provide a number of services directly to children and also indirectly through the services provided to schools as follows:

- Special needs assistant (SNA) posts are allocated to schools to support the additional care needs of students. This may involve observing children in the classroom and school environment and talking to them about their needs as part of the assessment.
- A range of supports and interventions for the management of challenging behaviour are provided directly to some students and at school level.
- Occupational therapy and speech and language therapy support and interventions are provided directly to some students and at school level.
- A range of supports and interventions are provided directly to children who are deaf/hard of hearing and children who are blind/visually impaired in schools, in children's homes and in pre-schools from time of diagnosis.
- Information and assistance is provided to schools in relation to the manner in which schools are intended to utilise and deploy their special education teaching resources.
- Professional development opportunities are provided to teachers and schools to build their capacity to support students with special educational needs.

Our Principles to Safeguard Children from Harm

The NCSE is guided by a number of the key principles of child protection and welfare as set out in the Children First National Guidance. These are:

- The safety and welfare of children is everyone's responsibility.
- The best interests of the child should be paramount.
- The overall aim in all dealings with children and their families is to intervene proportionately to support families to keep children safe from harm.
- Early intervention is key to getting better outcomes. Where it is necessary for the State to intervene to keep children safe, the minimum intervention necessary should be used.
- Children have a right to be heard, listened to and taken seriously. Taking account of their age and understanding, they should be consulted and involved in all matters and decisions that may affect their lives.
- Parents/guardians have a right to respect, and should be consulted and involved in matters that concern their family.
- A proper balance must be struck between protecting children and respecting the rights and needs of parents/guardians and families. Where there is conflict, the child's welfare must come first.
- Child protection is a multiagency, multidisciplinary activity. Agencies and professionals must work together in the interests of children.

Risk Assessment and Procedures

Our Child Safeguarding Statement has been developed in line with requirements under the Children First Act 2015 and the *Children First: National Guidance*, and Tusla's *Child Safeguarding: A Guide for Policy, Procedure and Practice*. To inform this Statement, we have carried out an assessment of any potential for harm to a child while availing of our services. Below is a list of the areas of risk identified and the list of procedures for managing these risks.

• Procedures for recording centrally reported concerns provided to Tusla and an Garda Síochána. The recording and storage of such records are maintained in a confidential and secure manner in line with data protection requirements.

- NCSE staff members' abide with school Child Safeguarding Statements and child protection guidelines and procedures.
- The maintenance of a record of mandated persons amongst staff in the organisation.
- The appointment of Designated Liaison Persons and a Relevant Person.

All procedures listed are available upon request.

Implementation

We recognise that implementation is an ongoing process. Our service is committed to the implementation of this Child Safeguarding Statement and the procedures that support our intention to keep children safe from harm while availing of our service. This Child Safeguarding Statement will be reviewed in June 2022 or as soon as practicable after there has been a material change in any matter to which the statement refers.
