


Nurturing Positive Dispositions: Tolerance over Racism

In nurturing the development of children as competent and confident communicators, the Primary Language Curriculum spotlights the importance of developing dispositions alongside concepts and skills.



Aistear defines dispositions as 'enduring habits of mind and action. A disposition is the tendency to respond to situations in characteristic ways' (Aistear, 2009, p.54). Positive dispositions mentioned in Aistear are independence, curiosity, concentration, creativity, **responsibility**, resilience, patience, perseverance, playfulness, imagination, being interested in things, enjoying problem-solving, being a good listener, assessing and taking risks, **being friendly**, wanting to communicate, **being accepting of others and of differences**, **being considerate**, being happy, **cooperating with others**.

Recent decades have seen significant changes in Irish society with over 200 languages now used in Ireland. Teachers are keen to enable pupils to become global citizens successfully engaging with an increasingly diverse world by providing interactions and learning experiences that foster acceptance and understanding of a range of people and cultures. How can we inspire a positive disposition of being accepting of others, being empathetic and considerate, to believe in social justice and actively counter bullying, stereotypes and racism?

The Aistear-Síolta Practice Guide tells us that 'dispositions are not fixed and they can be encouraged or discouraged, and strengthened or weakened', over time, 'through experience and through interactions with others and the environment'. Teachers should 'try to reinforce positive dispositions, by planning for a supportive environment and interactions that will encourage positive dispositions.

For example,



- model the disposition
- show that you value the disposition
- provide opportunities for children to develop dispositions (time, space, equipment or encouragement).
- take individual differences and preferences into account, for example by introducing changes gradually, or by giving extra support to a child who needs it'.

Children's Books to Support Conversations on Race, Racism and Tolerance

Children's books that share the personal experiences of diverse individuals are often one of the most effective and practical tools for initiating critical conversations in discussion after reading. To counter racist socialization and racial bias, we should acknowledge race and racism with children and read books that explore challenging themes.


