

Spring Animal Storybooks

A resource for parents/teachers within the 'Spring' theme for learning.

This resource is mostly suitable, to support primary school students to engage in learning about 'Spring' and spring animals through storybooks. The books all have a You Tube link for an audio version of the story as well as different resources and ideas to expand on learning opportunities for students.

Books about spring animals

Book title 1: The Tale of Peter Rabbit, Beatrix Potter

Description: A classic story that follows the mischievous young Peter Rabbit as he gets into and is chased around Mr McGregor's garden. Peter Rabbit is also a cartoon on Netflix.

Learning Opportunities: There are lots of resources to support learning in relation to The Tale of Peter Rabbit such as a visual maze, creating your own story and age specific comprehension activities such as mind maps.

Book title 2: Quackenstein hatches a family, Sudipta Bardhan-Quallen

Description: This has quite sophisticated language but great voices and animations – it's a modern take on the Ugly Duckling. It's a lovely story about how we can love things and people that are different from each other.

Book title 3: Oi Frog!, Kes Gray

Description: Hilarious rhyming book. All the books in this series are great for phonological awareness and students love them, especially when they find out what dogs sit on!

Book title 4: Rosie's Walk, Pat Hutchins

Description: Lovely book about a hen taking a walk around a farmyard. It's a great book to help teach and reinforce prepositions. You can use it as a narrated mime to help children explore these abstract concepts.

Book title 5: A Squash and a Squeeze, Julia Donaldson

Description: A Squash and a Squeeze is a funny picture book about farm animals.

Learning Opportunities: Julia Donaldson has a Facebook page where she reads her books, performs songs and poems she has written and based on her book.

Further resources to support learning about spring animals

Make a virtual pond: https://pbskids.org/elinor/games/elinor-pond-life Close captioning is available and the words are read aloud, although you can turn both these features off.

Frog spawn and tadpoles in real life: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=GgCL3JenMCs two little boys show us frog spawn and tadpoles in real life. Remember, it is illegal to remove frog spawn from the water (unless you are a teacher as frog spawn is so delicate) so just remember where you saw it and visit it again over time. Slow moving rivers in towns and cities may have frogspawn in sheltered pools - you don't just see it in the country.

Colour mixing: If parents have paint at home (or markers; crayons; food colouring or chalk) children can engage in colour mixing to create new colours e.g. blue + yellow = green; red + yellow = orange etc.). Here are some books to support learning around colour mixing:

- 'Little Blue and Little Yellow' is a book you could link this to Rosie's Walk mapping activities as well as to mixing colours. Here is the read aloud version https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=91ZmDCXlxAA
